Executive Summary

Day 139 is a diplomacy-on-trial edition: the single cross-cutting story is Foreign Minister Abbas Araghchi's recent interview on the war and negotiation, and the edition's most significant move is what the hardline press did with it. Sobh-e Iranian devotes its whole front page to a rebuttal, built around a 'vicious circle' graphic (War leads to Negotiation, Negotiation to Miscalculation, Miscalculation back to War) whose argument is that the diplomatic track does not end the cycle but powers it. Two signed op-eds, Alireza Kheradmand's 'Dogmatic Diplomacy' and Mohammadreza Zaheri's 'A miscalculation catastrophe: the dogmatism of a naive foreign policy,' invert the usual vocabulary so that it is now the negotiators, not their critics, who are branded rigid ideologues (tahajjor). The subhead enlists the Leader's own verdict, asking why he deemed the 'Islamabad understanding' (the ceasefire memorandum suspended in the prior cycle) a 'dark experience.' This is the diplomatic-track sequel to yesterday's Kayhan 'fifth column' editorial: having sought to criminalize the cost-of-war argument, the hardline camp now moves to delegitimize the negotiate-an-exit argument, and it borrows the leadership's language to do so.

The same interview is carried to the opposite end by the government and reformist and economic titles, which is why it, and not a strike, organizes the day. The government daily Iran trails 'Araghchi's untold accounts of the war and the negotiation' at the top of a page otherwise given to home-front reassurance; the reformist Sazandegi foregrounds his warning that the 'security gap' which enabled the bombing of the Leader's residence and the assassination of the martyred predecessor 'still exists,' turning the interview into a demand for accountability for the February failure rather than a case against diplomacy; and the economic Ta'adol lifts his line that 'one cannot gamble with the destiny of the country and its people' as a caution against escalation. One interview thus anchors both the hardline case that negotiation is the error and the reformist case that the real error was the unaddressed intelligence breach.

Beneath the diplomacy fight, the strike campaign against US regional bases continued, still branded and still attacker-sourced. Qods leads on 'pinpoint messages' delivered to US bases on Jordanian soil; Farhikhtegan maps struck bases across Iraq, Kuwait, Jordan and the Gulf under 'a chastening of Satan's bases' and threatens to make the Persian Gulf 'the graveyard of Trump's soldiers'; Vatan-e Emrooz frames an 'Iranian equation' of sustained pressure on US command centers and air defenses, naming the Al-Azraq base and a Kuwait desalination facility; and the IRGC wires brand the effort 'Operation Nasr 2,' waves 21 and 22, against Aqaba and Ali al-Salem. The English Iran Daily packages the campaign for foreign readers by anchoring its fatality claim to CENTCOM ('two soldiers killed in Iranian strikes on Jordan'), the one US-attributed element in the edition, though it reaches readers only as an Iranian outlet's rendering. Operation labeling is not uniform: Etemad still calls the effort 'Saaegheh 16.' Treat the continuing exchange as probable and every base-by-base and casualty tally, including the two US dead, as claim to be confirmed elsewhere.

Two quieter but coordinated lines fill out the page. A home-front-reassurance cluster runs across orientations: Iran kills an evacuation rumor about the Kharg crude-export island ('this is Kharg; life goes on'), Jomhuri-ye Eslami has the Hormozgan governor declare 'a full return of stability' on all provincial transport routes, and Qods and Etemad file southern-resilience dispatches ('the sound of life is louder than the blasts,' 'here, war is alive') - reassurance that is now itself a message-discipline product. And the economic press turns the chokepoint doctrine outward: Chaharsoo devotes its front page to a claimed US 'gasoline crisis' (pump prices near four dollars, inventories at their lowest since 2012, political anger at Trump), Farhikhtegan advertises 'twenty million barrels a day behind Hormuz and Bab-el-Mandeb,' and Jam-e Jam keeps the domestic bill in view with a 4,200-megawatt grid loss and an 80 percent Gulf LNG decline. Net assessment: this is a line-hardening edition, not a fresh-escalation one. The verifiable development is rhetorical and internal - the

leadership's line has moved from repudiating a specific deal to putting negotiation itself on trial - while the battlefield claims outrun corroboration, the home front is being managed as a morale problem, and the economic titles keep both an outward leverage claim and the domestic cost of the war visibly on the same page. Note also what is absent: Israel and Lebanon are largely off the front pages this cycle, the confrontation on the page having narrowed to US bases, Jordan, Kuwait and the Strait of Hormuz.

BOTTOM LINE The Foreign Minister's interview on the war and negotiation became the day's cross-cutting story, and the hardline press used it to put the diplomatic track on trial (relabeling negotiation 'dogmatism' and invoking the Leader's 'dark experience' verdict on the ceasefire memorandum), while the strike campaign against US bases in Jordan and Kuwait continued as attacker-sourced claim, a coordinated home-front-reassurance line declared the south stable, and the economic press turned the chokepoint squeeze outward into a claim of American gasoline pain.

CRITICAL SOURCING NOTE Compiled from nine Persian front-page scans (Iran, Sobh-e Iranian, Qods, Farhikhtegan, Sazandegi, Chaharsoo, Etemad, Ta'adol, Jomhuri-ye Eslami) read by vision, one English print (Iran Daily), four daily outlet Telegram channels read as text where no scan was in the batch (Kayhan, Vatan-e Emrooz, Jam-e Jam, Sobh-e No), and three agency wires (Defa Press, Fars News, Nour News) used only for corroboration. Tehran Times was unavailable at the time and is omitted. All military and battle-damage claims are single-side sourced and reported as claims; the CENTCOM-attributed US fatalities reach readers only through an Iranian outlet and are not independently confirmed; second-hand foreign-press items (the Wall Street Journal via Etemad, Jean-Francois Colosimo via Kayhan, Al-Mayadeen via Jomhuri-ye Eslami) remain flagged. Operation branding is inconsistent across outlets ('Nasr 2' waves 21-22 versus 'Saaegheh 16') and is noted rather than resolved. A Sazandegi top-strip item appearing to reference former FM Mohammad Javad Zarif was not fully legible and is not relied upon; the Jomhuri-ye Eslami notice for the martyrdom of Imam Hassan Mojtaba is a routine Shia commemoration unrelated to the current Leader. The current Leader is named in print today as 'Ayatollah Seyyed Mojtaba Khamenei' (Farhikhtegan); 'the martyred predecessor' denotes Ali Khamenei, assassinated 28 February 2026.

Macro Trend Analysis

① The diplomatic track is put on trial, not just a specific deal

The prior cycle repudiated the ceasefire memorandum; this one moves against negotiation as such. Sobh-e Iranian's 'vicious circle of dogmatism,' with its two signed op-eds relabeling diplomacy 'tahajjor' and invoking the Leader's 'dark experience' verdict, reframes the case for talks from a policy position into an ideological failing. This is the diplomatic-track analogue of the Kayhan 'fifth column' editorial: after the cost-of-war argument, the negotiate-an-exit argument is the next target of the message-policing campaign, and the leadership's own language is being used as the instrument.

② One interview, two opposite uses, refracting the elite split

Foreign Minister Araghchi's war-and-negotiation interview is the day's cross-cutting text precisely because the camps read it against each other. The hardliners (Sobh-e Iranian) treat it as the confession of a naive diplomacy; the reformists (Sazandegi) foreground his 'the security gap still exists' warning to reopen accountability for the February assassination; the government daily and the economic press (Iran, Ta'adol) lift his 'do not gamble with the country's fate' caution toward restraint. The same words anchor both the case against diplomacy and the case against the leadership's own security record.

③ The US-base strike campaign continues, rebranded and attacker-sourced

The kinetic line held its place below the diplomacy fight: 'pinpoint messages' to US bases in Jordan (Qods), a struck-bases map and a 'graveyard of Trump's soldiers' threat (Farhikhtegan), an 'Iranian equation' of sustained pressure naming Al-Azraq and a Kuwait desalination plant (Vatan-e Emrooz), and 'Operation Nasr 2' waves 21-22 on the IRGC wires. The English Iran Daily anchored the two-US-dead claim to CENTCOM for foreign readers. The labeling is inconsistent (Nasr 2 versus Etemad's 'Saaegheh 16') and every specific target and casualty figure remains single-side sourced.

4 Reassurance as a managed product: the home front declared stable

A coordinated reassurance line ran across orientations: an official denial of any Kharg-island evacuation (Iran), a governor's declaration of 'full stability restored' on Hormozgan's transport routes (Jomhuri-ye Eslami), and southern-resilience dispatches (Qods, Etemad). Paired with health-insurance extensions and farmer payments, the effect is to treat domestic morale and economic anxiety as a front to be managed centrally, an implicit acknowledgment that the war's home-front cost is a vulnerability the leadership judges worth actively countering.

5 The chokepoint doctrine turned outward into an economic-warfare claim

The economic press kept both halves of the ledger on the page. Chaharsoo devotes its front to a claimed US 'gasoline crisis' (four-dollar pump prices, inventories at a 2012 low, political anger at Trump), and Farhikhtegan advertises 'twenty million barrels a day behind Hormuz and Bab-el-Mandeb' - selling the coercion doctrine as pain inflicted on the American consumer. Yet Jam-e Jam's 4,200-megawatt grid loss and 80 percent Gulf LNG decline, and Ta'adol's crisis-relief prescriptions, keep the domestic cost equally visible: the leverage claim and the self-inflicted-cost warning share the same page.

Key Judgments

KJ-1 [HIGH] The Foreign Minister's interview became the day's cross-cutting story, and the hardline press used it to put the diplomatic track itself on trial. Sobh-e Iranian's entire front page - a 'vicious circle of dogmatism' graphic plus two signed op-eds ('Dogmatic Diplomacy,' 'A miscalculation catastrophe') - relabels negotiation as 'tahajjor' and anchors the charge to the Leader's 'dark experience' verdict on the ceasefire memorandum, while Iran, Sazandegi and Ta'adol carry the same interview to opposite ends. Significance: the leadership line has moved from repudiating a specific deal to delegitimizing the act of negotiating, the diplomatic-track sequel to the prior edition's 'fifth column' move against the cost-of-war argument; the domestic off-ramp is being narrowed rhetorically even as no new battlefield fact requires it.

KJ-2 [MODERATE-HIGH] The strike campaign against US regional bases continued but remained attacker-sourced, and even its one US-attributed element reaches readers only as an Iranian rendering. Qods ('pinpoint messages' to Jordan), Farhikhtegan (struck-bases map), Vatan-e Emrooz ('Iranian equation' naming Al-Azraq and a Kuwait desalination plant), Sobh-e No (Darkhovin and Abadan strikes claimed) and the IRGC wires ('Nasr 2' waves 21-22 on Aqaba and Ali al-Salem) all sit on one side; Iran Daily anchors 'two US soldiers killed in Jordan' to CENTCOM but carries it as its own report. Operation labeling is inconsistent ('Nasr 2' versus Etemad's 'Saaegheh 16'). Significance: treat the continuing exchange as probable and every base-by-base target and casualty figure, including the two US dead, as messaging to be confirmed from outside this monitor.

KJ-3 [MODERATE-HIGH] A coordinated home-front-reassurance line is the edition's second guided message, indicating the leadership treats domestic morale as a front. Iran kills an evacuation rumor about the Kharg crude-export island; Jomhuri-ye Eslami has the Hormozgan governor declare 'a full return of

stability' on all provincial transport routes; Qods and Etemad file southern-resilience dispatches; social-support items (health-insurance extension, farmer payments) reinforce the tone. Significance: reassurance calibrated this consistently across orientations is itself a message-discipline product, an implicit admission that economic anxiety and displacement in the south are vulnerabilities the leadership judges worth centrally managing rather than ignoring.

KJ-4 [MODERATE-HIGH] The economic press is converting the Hormuz chokepoint doctrine into an outward economic-warfare argument while keeping the domestic cost visible. Chaharsoo's front-page US 'gasoline crisis' (four-dollar pump prices, inventories at a 2012 low, anger at Trump) and Farhikhtegan's 'twenty million barrels behind Hormuz and Bab-el-Mandeb' sell the squeeze as American pain; Jam-e Jam's 4,200-megawatt grid loss and 80 percent Gulf LNG decline, and Ta'adol's crisis-relief prescriptions, keep the self-inflicted cost on the same page. Significance: the coercion doctrine is now being marketed as a winning US-facing strategy, but the economic titles have not abandoned the counter-argument that the chokepoint pressure damages the economy it claims to defend - the restraint signal persists beneath the leverage claim.

KJ-5 [MODERATE] Negative-evidence judgment: Israel and Lebanon are largely absent from the front pages this cycle, and the axis of confrontation on the page has narrowed to US bases, Jordan, Kuwait and the Strait of Hormuz. Gaza surfaces only as an attributed Kayhan item (a Palestinian figure's count of Israeli ceasefire violations); no monitored front page leads on Israel or the Lebanese front. Significance: the messaging has consolidated around the US-Iran military-economic contest, and the near-total absence of the Israel and Lebanon flashpoints is a finding in its own right - a shift back to either would be a signal, and the current silence should be logged rather than read as de-escalation.

KJ-6 [MODERATE] The succession-imagery vacuum noted in earlier editions continues to close: the current Leader is now routinely named in print. Farhikhtegan attributes the day's resistance line directly to 'Ayatollah Seyyed Mojtaba Khamenei,' and the principlist titles route the Iraq-gratitude message and the 'unity around the guardian' theme (Sobh-e No) through his authority. Significance: the leadership is now comfortable foregrounding the current Leader by name and title, though the hardest deterrent and enforcement lines are still voiced through the flagship (Kayhan) and the IRGC wires rather than in his own words - the managed-succession pattern persists and remains worth tracking.

ANALYST NOTE The English state daily curates the day for an international audience: it anchors the Jordan-casualty claim to CENTCOM (a Western source) rather than the IRGC wires, elevates Araghchi's 'reshaped security structure' line, and keeps an economic-governance and Central-Asia-corridor register that softens the war framing. The foreign-facing packaging remains consistently more sourced and less maximalist than the Persian hardline titles.

ANALYST NOTE As the government daily, Iran's lead is calibrated reassurance: it uses an official denial to kill an evacuation rumor about the Kharg export terminal, pairs it with presidential home-front visits, and keeps the economy and 'trust in officials' in view, declining the maximalist strike-tally framing of the hardline titles. It continues the government's role as the edition's continuity-and-restraint voice.

- Op-ed: 'دولتماسی متحجر' (Dogmatic diplomacy) by Alireza Kheradmand (علیرضا خردمند), a direct attack on Foreign Minister Araghchi's recent war-and-negotiation interview, relabeling diplomacy advocacy as tahajzor (تحجر, dogmatism/petrification).
- Op-ed: 'فاجعه محاسباتی: تحجر سیاست خارجی خوش خیال' (A miscalculation catastrophe: the dogmatism of a naive foreign policy) by Mohammadreza Zaheri, set over an Araghchi portrait.
- Sub-item: 'فراتر از برآوردها' (Beyond the estimates) by Mehdi Mahmoudi, claiming the armed forces' fire and resulting US casualties and damage 'surprised even foreign observers' - amplification of the strike campaign.
- Kicker: 'تشییع میلیونی، تغییردهنده معادلات مستکبران' (A millions-strong funeral, changer of the arrogant powers' equations), carrying the mourning-as-mobilization thread.

ANALYST NOTE Sobh-e Iranian executes the sharpest move of the edition: it turns the Foreign Minister's own interview into the exhibit for a campaign to delegitimize negotiation as such, relabeling diplomacy 'tahajzor' and citing the Leader's 'dark experience' verdict on the memorandum. This is the diplomatic-track analogue of the prior edition's Kayhan 'fifth column' editorial: both the cost-of-war argument and the negotiate-an-exit argument are being reframed from honest dissent into enemy-aligned error.

Conservative (Astan Quds Razavi, Mashhad)

"Pinpoint Messages, Delivered Far

Afield" «پیام‌های نقطه‌زنی در دوردست»

HIGH: cross-border strikes on US bases valorized as precise 'messages'



- Main: Leads on the strikes against US bases on Jordanian soil as 'pinpoint messages' (پیام‌های نقطه‌زنی) reaching distant targets, subheaded 'the shrapnel of Iran's precise strikes on the American occupiers' bases in Jordan' - the day's kinetic banner, framed as precise and message-bearing.
- Sub-item: 'هندسه رابطه ایران و عراق' (The geometry of Iran-Iraq relations): reads the Leader's (Mojtaba Khamenei's) message of gratitude to the Iraqi nation for the martyred predecessor's funeral procession as a strategic-realignment cue.
- Sub-item: Southern home front - 'صدای زندگی بلندتر از صدای انفجارهاست' (The sound of life is louder than the sound of the blasts), a resilience narrative from the war-hit south (sea, road, hospital, homes).
- Right rail: The custodian of Astan Quds Razavi, addressing commanders: 'increasing military power is the only path to deterring war and the enemies' greed.'
- Sub-item: A large World Cup retrospective feature, 'جامی که بیرون از زمین' (The cup that was won off the field) - normalcy and culture below the fold.

ANALYST NOTE Qods packages the Jordan strikes for a religious-conservative readership as disciplined 'messaging' and threads the Leader's Iraq outreach into a resistance-geometry frame, while the Astan Quds custodian supplies the doctrinal 'deterrence through strength' line. The southern-resilience story keeps the home-front cost visible without conceding vulnerability.

«A Chastening of Satan's Bases» «گوشمالی پایگاه‌های شیطان»



- Main: A regional map plotting struck US bases across Iraq, Kuwait, Jordan and the Gulf under the banner 'a chastening of Satan's bases' (گوشمالی پایگاه‌های شیطان), asserting America is taking 'one of the most significant blows in its history.'
- Banner: 'خلیج فارس را گورستان سربازان ترامپ می‌کنیم' (We will make the Persian Gulf the graveyard of Trump's soldiers), a maximalist deterrent threat tying the strike campaign to Gulf geography, 'from Chabahar to Hormuz.'
- Analysis: 'مسیر مقاومت فعال از انسجام می‌گذرد' (The path of active resistance runs through cohesion), citing the message of the Leader, 'Ayatollah Seyyed Mojtaba Khamenei' (آیت‌الله سیدمجتبی خامنه‌ای) - one of the clearest printed confirmations this cycle of the current Leader's name and title.
- Sub-item: 'روزی ۲۰ میلیون بشکه نفت پشت هرمز و باب‌المندب' (Twenty million barrels of oil a day behind Hormuz and Bab-el-Mandeb) - the dual-chokepoint economic-leverage claim.
- Kicker: 'خیلی تابلویید' (You are being very obvious!), a jab drawn from a Tehran city-council session report.

ANALYST NOTE Farhikhtegan carries the edition's most maximalist deterrent packaging: a struck-bases map, a 'graveyard of Trump's soldiers' threat, and the dual-chokepoint (Hormuz plus Bab-el-Mandeb) leverage claim. Its explicit 'Ayatollah Seyyed Mojtaba Khamenei' attribution is analytically useful: it confirms in print the succession naming that earlier editions found conspicuously indirect.

«حفره امنیتی همچنان وجود دارد» "The Security Gap Still Exists"



- Main: A foregrounded interview with Foreign Minister Seyyed Abbas Araghchi warning that the 'security gap' (حفره امنیتی) that enabled the bombing of the Leader's residence (بیت رهبری) and the assassination of the martyred Leader (Ali Khamenei, 28 February 2026) has not been eliminated and still shapes both decision-making and the psychological environment.
- Op-ed: 'یادداشت روز: لزوم دادخواهی بین‌المللی' (Note of the day: the necessity of an international legal claim), arguing certain Arab states are complicit in the US attacks on Iran and should be pursued in law.
- Sub-item: 'حامل پیام آمریکا' (Bearer of America's message), a report of a coded message reportedly conveyed through an Iraqi intermediary.
- Sub-item: A top-strip item appears to reference former foreign minister Mohammad Javad Zarif; the exact wording was not fully legible from the scan and is not relied upon here pending the printed text.

ANALYST NOTE The reformist Kargozaran daily uses the very Araghchi interview that the hardliners attack to make the opposite point: that an unresolved intelligence-security failure, not diplomacy, is the true vulnerability - a pointed reframe that keeps accountability for the February assassination on the agenda. Its 'international legal claim' editorial redirects blame outward at complicit Arab states rather than at Iran's negotiators.

«بحران بنزین در آمریکا» "The Gasoline Crisis in America"

MODERATE-HIGH: economic-warfare framing, chokepoint leverage on US prices



- Main: A full-page infographic arguing a US 'gasoline crisis': pump prices around 4 dollars a gallon (diesel about 5), inventories near 210 million barrels described as the lowest level since 2012, and rising political anger at the Trump administration - framing the war's oil disruption as domestic pain for Washington.
- Sub-item: Ties the crisis to chokepoint pressure - a '20 million barrels' figure behind the Gulf transit gap, a projected roughly 14 percent 2026 energy-cost rise, a claimed roughly 58 percent price increase and a roughly 42-million-barrel drawdown.
- Foot: 'سکوت مقصران اختلالات بانکی' (The silence of those responsible for the banking disruptions), a domestic accountability item on banking-system outages.

ANALYST NOTE Chaharsoo pivots from the prior edition's leadership-line banner to an economic-warfare argument aimed outward: that the chokepoint squeeze is inflicting measurable pain on the US consumer and on Trump's standing. The figures are outlet-sourced and directional, but the framing is the analytically significant part - the economic press is now selling the coercion doctrine as a winning US-facing strategy, not merely a domestic cost.

«تله موشکی ایران» "Iran's Missile Trap"



- Main: Leads on a claim, attributed to the Wall Street Journal citing US officials, that Iran's high-speed, maneuverable missiles (hard to intercept) have neutralized US air defenses - a second-hand foreign-press rendering, not independently verified and flagged as such.
- Sub-item: An Etemad interview assessing US options concludes a ground assault would be 'the least likely and most dangerous option.'
- Photo/caption: 'صاعقه شانزدهم' (Saaegheh Sixteen): reports the tenth day of battle and 'the failure of US deterrence,' over an image of black smoke and trucks on a southern road (Ahvaz).
- Op-ed: 'دشمنی تاریخی' (Historical enmity) by Hadi Haghshenas; plus a southern dispatch, 'اینجا جنگ زنده است' (Here, war is alive).

ANALYST NOTE Even the reformist Etemad leads on a hard military claim, but routes it through a foreign-press citation (WSJ) rather than the domestic wires, and pairs it with an analytic argument against escalation to a ground war - preserving a restraint frame while not conceding the battlefield. Note that the operation branding here ('Saaegheh 16') diverges from the 'Nasr 2' waves on the IRGC wires, a sign the campaign labeling is not uniform across outlets.

«چهار «راه حل» بحران اقتصادی» "Four 'Solutions' to the Economic Crisis"



- Main: An interview with economist Hossein Raghfar prescribing four measures for the deprived classes under crisis conditions: distribution of essential goods, tax-system reform, job creation, and the design of a coherent economic system; warns that inflationary shocks have 'shrunk the household table' (سفره).
- Sub-item: Carries Foreign Minister Araghchi's line that 'one cannot gamble with the destiny of the country and its people' (نمی شود با سرنوشت کشور و مردم قمار کرد) - the pro-restraint reading of his interview.
- Sub-item: 'جنوب نیازی به ترحم ندارد؛ چشم انتظار تصمیم است' (The south does not need pity; it awaits a decision) - pressing for policy action on the war-hit south.
- Right rail: 'بورس در مسیر آرامش' (The bourse on a calmer path); a housing-affordability item ('the dream of buying one square meter of an apartment').

ANALYST NOTE Ta'adol makes the economic counter-case explicit: the war's true front is the household budget, and Araghchi's 'do not gamble with the country's fate' is read as a caution against escalation. Alongside Sazandegi and Chaharsoo, the economic press remains the edition's steadiest restraint signal, arguing the war's cost is falling on the poorest.

"Full Return of Stability Across All of Hormozgan's Transport Routes"

LOW-MODERATE: home-front recovery and social-support reassurance

«بازگشت کامل ثبات در تمامی محورهای مواصلاتی استان هرمزگان»



- Main: Cites the governor of Hormozgan announcing a 'full return of stability' across all provincial transport routes and the repair of lines damaged in what it calls 'American terrorist attacks' - a home-front recovery and reassurance lead.
- Sub-item: 'المیادین: مخالفت‌ها در آمریکا با جنگ علیه ایران در حال افزایش است' (Al-Mayadeen: opposition within America to the war on Iran is rising) - a second-hand regional-media claim.
- Banner: A health-insurance extension (free coverage for the first-to-fifth income deciles) and 30 trillion toman paid to wheat farmers - social-support signaling.
- Op-ed: A 'Martyr Ayatollah Beheshti' editorial on the duties of those 'at the head' of society - an establishment-precedent frame.
- Right rail: A religious commemoration notice for the martyrdom of Imam Hassan Mojtaba (the Shia Imam) on 31 Tir - not to be conflated with the current Leader, Mojtaba Khamenei.

ANALYST NOTE The establishment daily's lead is pure reassurance: it uses the provincial governor to declare the southern transport arteries fully restored, wraps it in social-welfare announcements, and reaches for the Beheshti precedent for legitimacy. Its Al-Mayadeen citation is second-hand and directional, and the Imam Hassan Mojtaba notice is a routine religious event flagged here only to prevent confusion with Mojtaba Khamenei.

"Grid Capacity Down 4,200

MODERATE: infrastructure-cost accounting, Hormuz-sovereignty framing

Megawatts After War Damage» «کاهش ۴۲۰۰ مگاواتی ظرفیت شبکه برق در پی خسارات جنگ»

- Main: Leads on a 4,200-megawatt loss of grid capacity from war damage, with over 2,000 network points reported hit and cumulative losses put above 60 trillion toman; notes the Jadask distribution network restored to service.
- Sub-item: Analyst Nima Akbarkani on 'the second war - over sovereignty of the Strait of Hormuz,' reviewing the overnight US and Iranian target sets.
- Sub-item: Cites an IEA figure of a roughly 80 percent drop in Qatari and Emirati LNG supply (March-June versus 2025) amid Hormuz transit uncertainty.

ANALYST NOTE The IRIB daily keeps the war's infrastructure and energy costs on the front page even as the hardline titles trumpet the strikes - a state-media acknowledgment of the domestic price. Caveat: these grid-loss and LNG figures track the prior edition's closely, so read them as a continuing running tally rather than confirmed fresh damage for this cycle.

Kayhan

Hardline flagship (close to the Leader's office / IRGC), managing editor Hossein Shariatmadari

“America in Shock at Iran's Telling Blows” «آمریکا

SEVERE: 'new rules of engagement,' US logistics 'destroyed'

در شوک ضربات کاری ایران»

- Main: Leads that America is 'in shock' at Iran's strikes, claiming Iran has imposed 'new rules of engagement' on CENTCOM and 'destroyed US logistical supply lines in the region.'
- Sub-item: Reports 'Operation Nasr 2' strikes on the enemy's early-warning radar systems.
- Op-ed: Attributes to French writer Jean-Francois Colosimo the claim that 'if Washington is defeated by Tehran, Western authority will go into free fall' - a borrowed foreign voice, second-hand and not independently verified.
- Sub-item: Foreign desk cites a Palestinian government figure on 3,795 alleged Israeli ceasefire violations in Gaza with over 1,000 deaths (an attributed claim).
- Sub-item: Domestic notes - a 5.2-magnitude earthquake near Kermanshah; the Caspian closed through 21 July for severe weather.

ANALYST NOTE Kayhan sustains its maximalist register: enemy 'shock,' 'new rules of engagement,' severed US logistics, and a borrowed Western voice to universalize the stakes. Its daily 'Yadasht-e Rooz' editorial was not separately legible on the channel today, but the front-page line continues the flagship's role as the campaign's loudest amplifier. Read the capability claims as messaging, not established battle damage.

Sobh-e No

Principlist

HIGH: cohesion-behind-the-Leader messaging over an active exchange

“Unity Around the Command of the 'Guardian'” «وحدت حول امر «ولی»»

- Main: Leads on 'unity around the command of the vali (guardian)' - the internal-cohesion pillar, aligning the front behind the Leader's authority.
- Sub-item: Reports claimed US strikes on the Darkhovin nuclear plant and missile strikes on Abadan, alongside Iranian responses on US bases in Jordan and Kuwait (drone and ballistic).
- Sub-item: Claims of intercepted surveillance drones and downed US cruise missiles, framed as coordinated 'resistance-network' action.

ANALYST NOTE Sobh-e No carries the unity-and-obedience pillar, subordinating the strike reporting to the theme of rallying behind the Leader's command - the internal-discipline counterpart to the hardliners' outward deterrence. Its US-strike claims (Darkhovin, Abadan) are single-side sourced and to be treated as claims.

Vatan-e Emrooz

Hardline / principlist

HIGH: sustained-pressure doctrine, infrastructure targeting

“The Iranian Equation Begins” «آغاز معادله ایرانی»

- Main: Frames an 'Iranian equation' on the eighth day of battle, with strikes concentrating on US command centers, air-defense systems and support infrastructure across Bahrain, Kuwait and Jordan (naming the Al-Azraq base in Jordan and a Kuwait desalination facility).
- Sub-item: Emphasizes claimed weaknesses in US air-defense systems and a shift from reactive responses to 'sustained pressure.'
- Sub-item: Points to threats against regional energy routes, including the Strait of Hormuz.

ANALYST NOTE Vatan-e Emrooz supplies the doctrinal packaging - an 'Iranian equation' of sustained, target-set pressure - and pushes the geography toward infrastructure (a Kuwait desalination plant), signaling a willingness to threaten civilian-adjacent utilities. The eighth-day framing and target lists track the IRGC wires but are single-side sourced and should be read as claims.

Appendix A - The Leader's lead message: gratitude to the Iraqi nation (reconstructed from front-page renderings, partial)

Referenced on the Qods front page (پیام قدردانی رهبر معظم انقلاب از ملت عراق) and echoed across the principlist titles; the full primary text was not retrievable at compile time, so this is a faithful reconstruction of the reported content, not a verbatim translation.

The lead leadership message carried this cycle is attributed to the Leader (in current coverage, Mojtaba Khamenei) and takes the form of a message of thanks to the nation of Iraq for its participation in the funeral and farewell procession of the martyred predecessor (Ali Khamenei, assassinated 28 February 2026). As rendered on the front pages, the message frames the cross-border mourning as evidence of a shared religious and political bond between the two nations and as a demonstration of the 'resistance front's' cohesion rather than as private grief.

Qods reads the message through a strategic lens under the heading 'the geometry of Iran-Iraq relations,' presenting the Leader's gratitude as a deliberate cue about the alignment Tehran expects from Baghdad. The recurrence of the funeral-procession motif across titles keeps the February assassination a live, mobilizing grievance and supplies the emotional backdrop against which the day's strike claims and the hardening line on negotiation are staged.

Verification note: only the front-page framing of the message was available at compile time; the exact wording, dateline and any honorific formulas could not be confirmed against a primary source (khamenei.ir was not retrieved this cycle). The attribution to the current Leader follows the printed titles, which name him directly on at least one front page today (Farhikhtegan: 'Ayatollah Seyyed Mojtaba Khamenei'). Treat specific phrasings as reported, not as a confirmed transcript.

Appendix B - The day's flagged editorial: 'Dogmatic Diplomacy' (Sobh-e Iranian), on the Araghchi interview

Sobh-e Iranian front page, 29 Tir 1405; op-ed 'دییلماسی متحجر' bylined Alireza Kheradmand (علیرضا خردمند), paired with 'فاجعه' محاسباتی: تحجر سیاست خارجی خوش خیال bylined Mohammadreza Zaheri (محمدرضا ظاهری). Argument reconstructed from the front-page text; the byline authors are read directly from the page.

Sobh-e Iranian devotes its front page to a rebuttal of Foreign Minister Abbas Araghchi's recent interview on the war and negotiation. Its organizing image is a 'vicious circle' (دور باطل تحجر) in which War leads to Negotiation, Negotiation to Miscalculation (خطای محاسباتی), and Miscalculation back to War: the paper's claim is that the diplomatic track is not a way out of the cycle but the mechanism that keeps it turning. The subhead poses the loaded question of why the Leader deemed the 'Islamabad understanding' - the ceasefire memorandum - a 'dark experience' (تجربه تاریک), enlisting the leadership's own verdict as the premise of the argument.

The two signed pieces sharpen the charge. Kheradmand's 'Dogmatic Diplomacy' relabels the advocacy of negotiation as tahajjor (تحجر) - a petrified, doctrinaire reflex - inverting the usual hardline-versus-pragmatist vocabulary so that it is now the diplomats, not their critics, who are cast as rigid ideologues. Zaheri's companion piece, 'A miscalculation catastrophe: the dogmatism of a naive foreign policy,' set over a portrait of Araghchi, presses the same line: that a trusting, optimistic reading of the adversary is itself the strategic error. The effect is to move the argument from 'this deal was bad' to 'seeking a deal at all is the error.'

Analyst flag: this editorial is the diplomatic-track analogue of the prior edition's Kayhan 'fifth column' piece. Where that column sought to criminalize the cost-of-war argument, this one seeks to delegitimize the negotiate-an-exit argument, and it does so by borrowing the Leader's 'dark experience' formula as cover. The byline authors are verified from the page; the reconstruction of their argument is faithful to the front-page text but is not a verbatim translation, and no quotation here should be reproduced as an exact rendering without the primary print text.

Appendix C - Methodology and sourcing notes

iran-press-digest v2 pipeline, compiled 20 July 2026 (29 Tir 1405).

Sources: nine Persian front-page scans from the NewspaperTasnim batch (Iran, Sobh-e Iranian, Qods, Farhikhtegan, Sazandegi, Chaharsoo, Etemad, Ta'adol, Jomhuri-ye Eslami) read directly by vision; one English print (Iran Daily) from the Newspapers_Iran batch; and four daily outlet Telegram channels read as text where no scan was in the batch (Kayhan, Vatan-e Emrooz, Jam-e Jam, Sobh-e No). Three agency wires (Defa Press, Fars News, Nour News) were used only for corroboration and threat-signaling context, not as front pages. Tehran Times was unavailable at the time of compilation and is omitted.

Attribution firewall: all military and battle-damage claims (Operation 'Nasr 2' / 'Saaegheh' waves, strikes on Al-Azraq in Jordan, Ali al-Salem and Camp Arifjan in Kuwait, Aqaba, the two US fatalities in Jordan, tanker destructions in the Hormuz approaches, US strikes on Darkhovin and Abadan) are single-side sourced to Iranian outlets or the IRGC wires and are reported as claims, not established facts. The one US-sourced element - CENTCOM's reported acknowledgment of two US soldiers killed in Jordan, carried by Iran Daily - is flagged as a rendering by an Iranian outlet and not independently confirmed here. Second-hand foreign-press items (Etemad citing the Wall Street Journal citing US officials on missile penetration; Kayhan citing the French writer Jean-Francois Colosimo; Jomhuri-ye Eslami citing Al-Mayadeen) remain flagged and are not verified.

Named-figure and translation caveats: the current Leader is named directly in print today (Farhikhtegan: 'Ayatollah Seyyed Mojtaba Khamenei'); 'the martyred Leader' / 'martyred predecessor' denotes Ali Khamenei (assassinated 28 February 2026). Foreign Minister Abbas Araghchi, President Masoud Pezeshkian, Deputy FM Kazem Gharibabadi (from the prior edition's memorandum thread) and economist Hossein Raghfar are attributed as printed. Operation branding is inconsistent across outlets ('Nasr 2' waves 21-22 on the wires versus 'Saaegheh 16' in Etemad); the divergence is noted rather than resolved. A Sazandegi top-strip item appearing to reference former FM Mohammad Javad Zarif was not fully legible and is not relied upon. The Jomhuri-ye Eslami notice for the martyrdom of Imam Hassan Mojtaba is a routine Shia religious commemoration and is not connected to the current Leader. Jam-e Jam's grid-loss and LNG figures closely track the prior edition and are treated as a continuing tally. All English renderings of Persian headlines are editorial translations. Per house style, the em dash is not used anywhere in this product.
